### The Why Behind the Composting Project

Some Highland staff members sought to eliminate the food waste that we as a school community create.

- In 2023-2024, unwanted/unopened food was donated to Master's Manna
  - 2,964 lbs collected in 23-24 school year
- This school year, under the guidance of the cafeteria aides, unwanted/unopened perishables and non-perishables (breakfast and lunch) are collected. Highland's Social Worker then assembles bags to distribute to 8 Highland families who have expressed food insecurity.

#### What We Have Learned and Accomplished So Far

- Volunteers came during lunch waves 9/16-9/27 to help students learn to sort.
- Formed steering committee (Highland's Green Team) 3
  BOE members, parents, school staff; We met on the
  following dates: 9/24, 11/12, 1/28 (email), and 5/6
  - o 2024-2025 Green Team Agendas and Minutes
- Mrs. Sullivan went on morning meeting announcements to communicate roll out of composting program.
- Beginning of year OT, girl and boy scouts ripped brown paper bags up.
- Invaluable partnership with our School Custodian, Steve Greenwood and Cafeteria Staff
- Paper bag (from breakfast program) recycling was implemented - carried to recycling dumpster.
- Currently collecting ~5 lbs of compostable material per day.

#### What We Have Learned and Setbacks So Far

- Volume of waste created is more than our commercial tumbler can handle.
- Compost takes longer to be ready than we anticipated
  - o Cold weather decreases breakdown
  - Mr. Greenwood added "compost accelerator" to bin (purchased with grant funding) in May
- Not all cafeteria menu items (i.e., pizza, steak and cheese grinder) lend themselves to composting.
- Breakfast program changes (no longer free) decreased volume of food for donation.



### We Used the Mansfield Middle School Guide to Successfully Implement Composting at Highland

Find a champion to spearhead the program - Sue Sullivan

Develop the program with a diverse committee that includes custodial staff, school administrators, teachers, parents, food service, public works staff - Highland Green Team

Make the daily composting routine a staff duty that can be done in lieu of bus duty, detention and/or cafeteria duty – Emily Banach allowed school staff to leave at dismissal time if helped in sorting cafeteria waste at beginning of the school vear.

Enlist parent/child (family) help in turning the compost - Boy and Girl Scouts

Publicize tangible success to the school community - in progress

Research what is involved in a schoolwide composting operation Clearly define the scope of the project (it's okay to start small!)
Follow the school system protocol for developing new programs - verified with school principal and school superintendent approved grant funding
Get support from all components of the school community – shout out to Steve
Greenwood, school custodian and Cafeteria Staff

#### How Student Learning is Impacted

- Increasing awareness for youngest learners about food waste, sustainability, and altruism.
- Learning about composting in action through their experiences in the cafeteria or with their classroom teachers.
- Vocabulary words learned perishable, nonperishable, decompose
- Learning sorting skills perishable, nonperishable, liquids, compostable
- Small actions can have a BIG impact!

#### Supplementing Kindergarten Science Unit 3 - "Living Things"

Student Objective - I can explain how (plants and) animals change their environment to survive.

ES.SC.4.1 Record information and create a prediction or examine results

 Kindergarten teachers met with Dan Wostbrock (Science Curriculum Coordinator) during Grade Level meeting.

 Mrs. Sullivan shared composting update and asked other K teachers to add their worms/dirt/scraps to compost bin when done with their science lessons.

 Kindergarten student's listened to <u>Wonderful Worms</u> by Linda Glaser and <u>Carl</u> and the <u>Meaning of Life</u> by Deborah Freedman.

 Added apple pieces (leftover from breakfast program), eggshells, coffee grounds, lettuce scraps to worm habitat/compost bin.

### Plans for Remaining School Year/Next Year

- Share program updates with Highland staff and families.
- Monitor the Compost Pile Students measure and record the temperature of the compost pile each week. Use this information to determine the success of the pile and troubleshoot problems with the pile.
- Determine where compost is in "cooking" at the end of the year and distribute to Sheehan Environmental Action Club, Wallingford Garden Club, and Highland families
  - Send sample to Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station to test Ph level
- Consider putting 'cooking' compost in garbage bins to free up the tumbler. Continue to foster relationship with Sheehan Environmental Action Club.
